Interesting Facts

More than one million pounds of food is distributed each month through the member agencies of Mississippi Food Network.

You will see in the pages of our 2006 Annual Report the extent of our efforts to serve the hungry in Mississippi. We hope that this report will give you a good idea of how we are accomplishing our mission of creating a hunger-free Mississippi through our programs and our people. Our numbers are impressive. During this last fiscal year we distributed more than 15 million pounds of food and groceries, the equivalent of 12 million meals. This includes more than three million pounds of Hurricane Katrina disaster relief food provided in our service area. Working with America's Second Harvest, The Nation's Food Bank Network, our members, community organizations and hundreds of generous people and businesses, we made a significant difference in the lives of storm victims while continuing our regular operations.

Yet as hard as we work to serve the hungry, we know the scope of the task is massive and grows larger every year. According to the federal government's official definition of poverty, 18.6% of the population in Mississippi live below the poverty level and do not meet the minimum standards for subsistence. Many of these individuals are employed full time and working every day, but their wages do not provide enough to meet their needs. Against this huge need is the Mississippi Food Network, dedicated to providing assistance in the most far reaching and effective way we can.

This year, with strong community support, we have begun several new initiatives. We have started a fresh produce program whereby we provide nutritious fresh produce to our member agencies without charge. This complements our anti-obesity initiative which is designed to promote a healthy diet and to educate our clients in the ways of good nutrition. In addition, we now have a Mobile Pantry whereby we are able to take the food to the people. A gift of a refrigerated trailer from KLLM Transport Services has enhanced our ability to move fresh produce and other perishables. The Board of Directors and our staff are dedicated to a proactive approach and we continue to look for innovative ways to provide better service and improve distribution.

As we celebrate the start of our twenty-fourth year of service, we are always mindful of our mission to relieve poverty-related hunger in our service area by efficiently collecting and distributing wholesome food and through education and advocacy. This annual report tells our story in numbers, words and photographs. As you look it over, remember that each and every one of you plays a role in enabling this organization to provide so much support to so many. Our mission can only be accomplished through the generosity of others. Thank you for all that you do.

And the work goes on.

Hurricane Katrina

No one could have imagined the effects of Hurricane Katrina to our State in August 2005. This was a humbling experience for Mississippi Food Network as we mobilized to begin our relief efforts. While we began on a small scale we escalated quickly to an unbelievable amount of food coming in and going out. The food and supplies came from all over the country - Kroger, Brookshire's Grocery Company, Sanderson Farms, vendors in Wisconsin, Coastal Sunbelt Produce from Maryland, America's Second Harvest in Chicago and many others from all over the country.

In the first three months after Hurricane Katrina we distributed more than three million pounds of food, water and other household supplies. Board members, community volunteers, and staff worked long hard hours to get everything sorted and distributed. Company G from the Indiana National Guard spent four weeks working with us to help transport food, water and cleaning supplies to the Coastal area every day. Member Agencies, churches and other relief organizations arrived to help with distribution to shelters and the disaster areas.



We can never explain the impact of Hurricane Katrina - but we can be thankful that we were here to help others when it was needed the most and to do what we do best - distribute food and other products to needy people - because this is the business we are in at Mississippi Food Network.

Volunteers

Volunteers are an integral part of the operations of the Mississippi Food Network. Last year our volunteers helped pack CSFP boxes, stocked self-serve shelves, sorted and packed thousands of canned items, provided clerical duties, and served on the Board of Directors. Last year we averaged 6,240 volunteer hours which saved labor costs that we were able to put into other programs. We appreciate our volunteers who provide a great service to our organization. Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program is designed to serve individuals whose income and circumstances make them especially vulnerable to malnutrition. CSFP provides nutritious supplemental foods to elderly persons, age 60 years and over and five-year old children who no longer qualify for WIC. The monthly food boxes are prepared with at least nine types of nutritious foods purchased by USDA. Distribution is handled through our member agencies in authorized counties. Last year we distributed 2,921,685 pounds of food through the CSFP program.

Member Agencies

Participating agency membership is limited to charitable organizations and out-reach programs recognized by the IRS as being either non-profit 501c3 or



religious organizations who meet certain standards. There is no charge to the agencies to become a member of Mississippi Food Network. Currently there are 280 member agencies that consist of soup kitchens, food pantries, day care centers, youth programs, senior citizen centers, shelters and human service programs. Our member agencies serve more than 70,000 people each month.

20% of these are senior citizens over 60 years of age and 27% are children under the age of 18. There are approximately 140,000 meals served each month at congregate feeding sites and more than 20,000 families that are receiving assistance through the various food pantries.



Healthy Foods - Healthy People

Through our fresh produce initiative that was adopted by the Board of Directors, we distributed 669,512 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables. The program has gotten off to a good start and we are looking forward to distributing even more during the next year. One of the Mobile Pantry distributions was at Camp Hip Hop in Picayune at their Summer Feeding Program. This was done in collaboration with the United States Department of Agriculture, Department of Defense, Mississippi State University Extension Services, Mississippi Department of Human Services, and the Mississippi Department of Education.



Subsidiary Distribution Organization (SDO)

The Food Bank of South Central Mississippi is a Subsidiary Distribution Organization (SDO) of the Mississippi Food Network. They service Lincoln, Pike, Franklin, Lawrence, Jeff Davis, Walthall, Wilkinson and Amite Counties. The twenty-nine agencies that utilize the SDO in South Mississippi distributed 1,182,080 pounds of food and served approximately 4,000 people each month. Twelve Baskets is a SDO of Bay Area Food Bank in Mobile, AL, but also works with Mississippi Food Network in distributing USDA food through the TEFAP program and CSFP boxes in the Gulf Coast Counties of Hancock, Harrison, Jackson, Pearl River, Stone, George, Perry and Greene.

Food Drives

Food drives are an important part of the operations of Mississippi Food Network to help stock the self-serve area of our warehouse. The National Letter Carriers Food Drive, 16 WAPT Food for Families Football Challenge, Curves, Mississippi Department of Employment, Pinelake Baptist Church Children's Ministry and others help keep the shelves stocked during the year. Our Facilities

Mississippi Food Network has a total of 84,000 square feet of warehouse space located in two buildings. We have 128,000 cubic feet of cold storage capacity with refrigeration and freezers. This space is used for the general warehouse, cold storage, CSFP packing and storage, and administrative offices.



Our warehouse has 11 dock slots for incoming and outgoing loads. Our fleet is made up of six vehicles including an 18 wheeler tractor and trailer, an additional 53 ft. trailer, a 24 ft. truck, and two vans. Our



tractor-trailer rig makes drop off deliveries all around the state each day during the week. Last year we delivered to 74 agencies located in rural areas each month and drove more than 60,000 miles in our tractor-trailer rig. The 24 ft. truck is used for CSFP deliveries, our Mobile Pantry and to pick up food and other supplies as needed.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)

TEFAP is a Federal program that helps supplement the diets of low-income Americans by making commodity foods available to distributing agencies. The foods are distributed through pantries and/or used in soup kitchens. During the year, Mississippi Food Network distributed 6,296,782 pounds of food to qualified recipients through the TEFAP program.
